Course Descriptions: This course is a (very) broad overview of the diverse texts that make up the New Testament. Students will be introduced to issues and concepts that surround the composition and interpretation of these texts, and then engage with selected sections to deepen the application of those concepts.

Course Objectives:

- Students will become familiar with the literary forms, theological perspectives, and historical (Roman imperial) contexts that characterize the New Testament Texts
- Students will be exposed to different methodological tools available, and begin to develop their own skills, for spoken and written theological interpretation.
- Students will identify and utilize Lutheran hermeneutical perspectives in the interpretation of Scripture, particularly Law/Gospel dialectic.
- Students will engage one particular text in a focused manner, incorporating the learning from this course.

Course Texts:

Session I: Introduction to the New Testament and its Context Topics:

- Overview of the New Testament: Structure and Themes
- Historical Context: The Jewish and Greco-Roman Worlds
- Discussion of Powell's Chapters 1-3
- **Assignment 1** On the first day of class, we will do an in-class "quick-write," where you answer the question: Where did the New Testament come from? There is no right answer to this, and no particular format is expected. It is intended to start the process of exploring your engagement with the NT texts in a different way. The point is to get a sense of where you come from and where you are in your engagement with the NT.

Session II: Key Events and Their Impact on Early Christianity Topics:

- Exploration of the Seven Key Events from Carter's Book
- The Life and Ministry of Jesus: Implications for the Early Church
- Discussion of Powell's Chapters 4-6
- **Assignment 2** Choose one of the seven events discussed in Carter's book and write a 1-2 page paper on its significance for the development of early Christian thought and practice. Include references to both Carter and Powell. This paper is due the day of our second meeting

Session III: The New Testament's Message and Its Relevance Today Topics:

- Theological Themes in the New Testament: Law and Gospel
- The Role of Community in the Early Church
- Discussion of Powell's Chapters 7-9 and Conclusion
- **Assignment 3** **Option A**: Use the NTNL Chatbot to ask a question about a NT biblical text. Interact with their interpretation in a 1-2 page essay. What did it get right? How would you change the answer? **Option B**: Write a 1-2 page essay discussing how the historical context of the New Testament enhances our reading of the text today. This assignment is due the day of our third meeting.
